

Negroes Are Refused Service At S & W

Three Negroes, two Raleigh pastors and a Shaw University student NAACP leader, staged a "stand-in" at the S & W Cafeteria Saturday.

The hour-long demonstration stemmed from what the Negroes called their "desire to have breakfast."

The Negroes were blocked as they stood in the service line by managers.

According to Neil O'Brien, an S&W official, the Negroes stood in line from 8:10 a.m. until about 9:15 a.m. when the cafeteria closed. O'Brien said the restaurant regularly closed at that time to prepare for lunch.

The pastors, the Revs. J. H. Bryant, Baptist, and Oscar McCloud, Presbyterian, both of Raleigh, were accompanied by integrationist leader Percy High, who

is the vice president of the all-Negro Shaw University NAACP branch.

High was among four NAACP members who staged a "swim-in" at a Raleigh white public swimming pool. The Aug. 6 demonstration resulted in the city closing its two public pools for what the city council called a "temporary" period.

The three Negroes, described as well-dressed and solemn, stood in line with a manager while other patrons filed past them on their way to pick up trays.

The S&W, one of Raleigh's largest downtown restaurants, has restaurants in many major Southern cities.
