

Four Arrested At Theater Here

Four youths, three Negroes and one white, were arrested on trespass charges about 8:40 p. m. Friday as efforts to integrate the Ambassador Theater here continued.

At one time, Negro pickets and

sympathizers numbered 107, according to a count made by theater manager C. E. Stone.

Four others were arrested Thursday night while attempting to get seats in the white section of the theater which belongs to a chain in which Raleigh Mayor W. G. Enloe is district manager.

Stone gave this account of incidents that led to the Friday night arrests:

A Negro girl and her white escort and a Negro couple pushed past the ticket taker and to the main door where they were halted.

When the four refused to leave the theater after being told they were blocking the entrance, Stone called police.

Post Bond At Jail.

Officer Rudolph Perry and R. F. Johnson arrested the four and took them to the Wake County Jail. They were released some 50 minutes later after posting bonds of \$25 each for their appearance in City Court on April 18.

Extra police were dispatched to the theater to keep traffic moving along Fayetteville Street.

Those arrested were identified as: Richard M. Tulley, 20, white, whose address was given as the Andrew Johnson Hotel; Lucy B. Patterson, 22, William Lorinzo Turner, 19, and Mary A. Watford, 19, all of 1315 Oakwood Ave.

Stone was unable to say how the Negroes got tickets to the movie. "It's almost impossible to control the sale of tickets," he said.
