

270 Negroes, 28 Whites In Desegregation March

Around 270 Negroes and 28 white persons participated in another anti-segregation demonstration in downtown Raleigh from 7 to 9 p.m. Monday.

From 25 to 30 white youths, carrying a sign reading "Segregated Raleigh Or Bust," marched parallel to the demonstrators along Wilmington, Morgan, Fayette-

ville, Davie and Salisbury streets.

Two white youths were arrested on charges of carrying concealed weapons. Traffic was allowed on Fayetteville Street except while the demonstrators were returning to the Shaw University campus.

A prison bus loaded with 20 policemen under Sgt. C. W. Haswell was held in readiness at the corner of Lenoir and Fayetteville streets. They remained in the bus, however.

Hecklers shouting "2, 4, 6, 8, we don't want to integrate," and "push 'em back, push 'em back . . ." jerring, blowing whistles and yelling insults, followed the line of march.

Det. Sgt. John Broadwell charged Robert Earl Honeycutt, 15, of 538 N. Person St. with carrying a concealed weapon about 7:30 p.m. in front of the Justice Building on Morgan Street. The youth, who police said had a dagger, was cited to Wake Juvenile Court.

Officer G. W. Williams arrested Cecil Wilkerson, 17, of 7 Elizabeth St., about 7:40 p.m. at the corner of Fayetteville and Hargett. Police said Wilkerson had a pocketknife wrapped in leather with a handle similar to a blackjack.
